It has been a very busy few months at Vidiyal and we include as much information as we can in this newsletter.

Examination results

12th standard, taken when the young people are 17, is equivalent to our A-levels. It is required that a student passes in every subject to achieve a qualification. The Vidiyal youngsters achieved 7 successes out of 8, the remaining student just needing to retake one subject. In addition, Venkatashwari scored 85% and Balamurugan scored full marks in Mathematics. It is also encouraging to know that 5 of the young people are girls.

10th standard, taken at 15 years old, is equivalent to our GCSE's. 100% success was achieved by 9 girls and 4 boys. Some of the marks were so exceptionally high that the results were reported in the newspapers.

Madurai: Despite living in acute poverty, four slum children in Madurai have managed to score over 80% marks in the SSLC board examination, the results of which were declared recently, thanks to Vidiyal, a nongovernment organisation.

A resident of Thideer Nagar, R Bhagampriya, who secured 470, said, "I managed to get a good score because of attending training classes conducted by Vidyal in the evening hours." The girl's father Rama-

The girl's father Ramamurthy, a daily wage labourer, has been struggling to support his family with his meagre monthly income of ₹ 4000.

P Nandhishwari, daughter of sewage cleaner, scored 416 marks with 99 in Science. She, who aspires to be a Math teacher, too gives the credit to the NGO for con-

ducting science forum which helped her score high in the subject.

Sonamuthu, who had discontinued studies in class nine, rejoined and passed out with 425 marks.

A Arunkumar, a differently-abled, also coached by Vidiyal scored 325 out of 400 marks.

Vidiyal's effort to engage trained youths from slums as volunteers to teach these kids has borne fruit.

Jim reflected on the camp at the end of the nine days: "Everyone felt very happy at the valedictory and there were a lot of take home gifts, not only the material ones but also the non material ones like joy, friendship and a feeling of oneness. The story in the assembly was brought by Ramachandran, one of our alumni. He brought the visual image to the stage of how the journey of a child begins at Vidiyal when he joins the "beginners" group and how he or she can reach up to the Olirum Muhangel forum (alumni) and continue the journey of victory to transform the society. It was very moving and touching.

The presence of the alumni was very much felt and they supported and contributed to the success in every possible way. The roof top of Vidiyal was packed with parents and children. The children thanked you all for being close companions in their journey down the years."



Sponsor Day

Education Awareness Campaign

Following on from the individual examination successes, Vidiyal has launched an education awareness campaign in the slums of Madurai. The programme was run by the Vidiyal Alumni and the theatre group of the Vidiyal Child Rights Movement. The team visited 5 slums in Madurai and emphasized the importance of education. 63 children who were school drop-outs were identified and efforts have been taken to place these children back in school.

Slum children egged on to continue studies

MADURAI: On the eve of a new academic year, with a view to discouraging poor children from dropping out of school, Olirum Muhangal, a citybased organisation, conducted awareness programmes on the importance of co

ntinuing education in the slums of the city on Sunday.

Members of the organisation said that they were able to complete their education with the assistance of 'Sakthi-Vidiyal', a non-governmental organisation based in Madurai, and that they were working while pursuing higher studies. "Since all of us received support and encouragement to complete our studies despite many hurdles, we decided to give back to the community by propagating the importance of education through folk dance and skit," said K. Kalidass, president of Olirum Muhangal.

The group performed traditional dances such as 'Maattu kombattam,' 'Kaliyal' and 'Oyilattam,' and put up a mime show in the slums at Kalmedu. At S.M.P. Colony, we found 20 school dropouts and at Kalmedu 30," said R. Venkateswari, a volunteer.

Reasons for dropping out

Mr. Kalidass said that in most of the cases, the children had either dropped out owing to poverty or a mental. block about school and were reluctant to continue their studies.

"After a detailed survey of all the slums, we will hand contact the children and help them continue their education," he said.

N. Surya, another volunteer, who is studying ninth standard, said that in many places they visited, the parents approached them with an appeal to encourage their children to get back to school. "In many cases, children drop out because they do not want to study or they are scared of something that might have happened at school. We talk to them about the importance of going to school and motiva-

Any such legacy to a registered charity will be free of Inheritance Tax and not liable to Capital Gains Tax or Income Tax; it will not affect the gifts you wish to leave to other people or charities in your Will.
